I decided instead to introduce you to the contents of this particularly interesting issue.

Can you imagine life in West Bengal without rice? That is exactly what happened in the late 1960s and early '70s when rice was not available in the open market. 'A Rice Story' is about the impact of scarcity, both personal and political.
